## From the Desk of Father Ed:

Dear Parishioners,

For the next five weeks we will be hearing from the Gospel of John, the 6<sup>th</sup> chapter, which is known as the Bread of Life discourse. The Church takes this period of Ordinary Time and focuses on the Eucharist; the greatest gift that God gives to us – the gift of His very self in the form of Bread and Wine. The Evangelist, St. John tells us that the Passover was near. The Passover is celebrated to remember how God saved the Jewish people from the 10<sup>th</sup> plague where all the first born in Egypt died except for those who marked the lintels of their doors with the blood of the lamb. God brought his people out of Egypt, the land of slavery, and into the promise land of Canaan. The Gospel writer gives a hint that Jesus will give a greater meaning to the feast of Passover. Jesus is the true “Lamb of God” who by dying on the Cross saves us from the slavery of sin and death and leads us into the promise land, the Kingdom of Heaven. It is at the Passover meal, the Last Supper, that Jesus institutes the Sacrament and Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Today’s Gospel the miracle of the loaves is recorded in all four Gospels. It reassures us of Jesus’ power that is greater than the prophet Elisha as we heard in our first reading. Elisha was able to feed 100 people with 20 Barley loaves. Jesus who is both fully God and fully man can feed many more, 5,000 people and do it with less, only 5 loaves.

This miracle reassures us that God can and will provide for us. He gives us food for our bodies to help us on our journey here on earth.

The Gospel anticipates the Eucharistic meal. Jesus took the Bread, said the Blessing and then distributed the meal. These actions of Jesus are essential to the celebration of the Eucharist. Not only does Jesus supply food for our bodily needs but more importantly he gives us the needed food for our souls. He gives us the Bread of Life that is his very self. He gives us the greatest gift. When we receive our Lord in the Eucharist it is the closest we can be to our God while on the face of this earth. At the end of today’s Gospel we hear how the people recognized Jesus as the Great Prophet that was foretold by Moses. The people wanted to carry him off and make him their king. They wanted and hoped that Jesus would be a military king, one who would be like King David and defeat and expel the

occupying Romans from their land. Jesus did not allow this and he withdrew into the mountain region. Jesus did not allow this to happen because his kingdom is not of this earth, rather his kingdom is heavenly. The people in the Gospel wanted Jesus to be the king they wanted, not God’s plan.

*For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways...For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, my thoughts higher than your thoughts. (Is 55:8-9)*

The Kingdom he brings is a spiritual one.

*For the kingdom of God is not a matter of food and drink, but of righteousness, peace, and joy in the holy Spirit. (Rom 14:17)*

Jesus gives us the spiritual food we need – the Eucharist, the Memorial of his Passion and Death so that we can be united as one, as his mystical body and remain in him until he leads us home to the promise land in Heaven.

# Catechism of the Catholic Church:

## **THE SACRAMENT OF THE EUCHARIST**

**1323** “At the Last Supper, on the night he was betrayed, our Savior instituted the Eucharistic sacrifice of his Body and Blood. This he did in order to perpetuate the sacrifice of the cross throughout the ages until he should come again, and so to entrust to his beloved Spouse, the Church, a memorial of his death and resurrection: a sacrament of love, a sign of unity, a bond of charity, a Paschal banquet ‘in which Christ is consumed, the mind is filled with grace, and a pledge of future glory is given to us.’”

**1324** The Eucharist is “the source and summit of the Christian life.”<sup>136</sup> “The other sacraments, and indeed all ecclesiastical ministries and works of the apostolate, are bound up with the Eucharist and are oriented toward it. For in the blessed Eucharist is contained the whole spiritual good of the Church, namely Christ himself, our Pasch.”

**1325** “The Eucharist is the efficacious sign and sublime cause of that communion in the divine life and that unity of the People of God by which the Church is kept in being. It is the culmination both of God’s action sanctifying the world in Christ and of the worship men offer to Christ and through him to the Father in the Holy Spirit.”

**1326** Finally, by the Eucharistic celebration we already unite ourselves with the heavenly liturgy and anticipate eternal life, when God will be all in all.

**1329** The Lord’s Supper, because of its connection with the supper which the Lord took with his disciples on the eve of his Passion and because it anticipates the wedding feast of the Lamb in the heavenly Jerusalem.

The Breaking of Bread, because Jesus used this rite, part of a Jewish meal, when as master of the table he blessed and distributed the bread, above all at the Last Supper. It is by this action that his disciples will recognize him after his Resurrection, and it is this expression that the first Christians will use to designate their Eucharistic assemblies; by doing so they signified that all who eat the one broken bread, Christ, enter into communion with him and form but one body in him.

**1385** To respond to this invitation we must prepare ourselves for so great and so holy a moment. St. Paul urges us to examine our conscience: “Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of profaning the body and blood of the Lord. Let a man examine himself, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup. For any one who eats and drinks without discerning the body eats and drinks judgment upon himself.” Anyone conscious of a grave sin must receive the sacrament of Reconciliation before coming to communion.
